DATA HIGHLIGHT

Interviews with young adults have begun to illuminate a more complicated picture regarding risk factors for entry into DMST/CSEC than what research suggest. While current research highlights interactions with juvenile justice systems as a severe risk factor for DMST, 66% of young adults we interviewed who were placed in juvenile justice halls or residential treatment programs recalled experiencing "safety," "stability" or "less stress" compared to "home."

SO WHAT?

Identifying risk factors is a crucial part of understanding why DMST/CSEC happens, and for developing interventions to end it. However, risk factors are not unidirectional pathways to DMST/CSEC. Risk factors for some were protective factors for others -- pointing to a more nuanced picture of what a "risk factor" can be and how we think about them. This nuance is critical for us to consider when working with individuals and/or on system-wide interventions for ending DMST/CSEC, as it reinforces the fact that there is


